A Time to Build

“Our house is still red!” exclaims 3-year-old Anessa Stutzman every time she and her mother, Jill Stutzman pull up to their Habitat home.

The cute three bedroom house, located on a quiet street in Mentone, has a welcoming front porch and a nice yard. But for Jill and Anessa, what makes the house a home is all the love from family, friends and the Habitat community that made it all possible.

Jill and her infant daughter moved in with Jill’s parents three years ago when Jill moved back into the area from out-of-state. A single working mother, Jill appreciated the support of her family during Anessa’s first years. But, when her mom told her that Habitat for Humanity was building a house in Mentone, Jill began learning about Habitat and whether or not she would qualify.

“I realized how little I actually knew about Habitat and what they do and that many others don’t understand either,” Jill said.

“I think that a lot of people had the show *Extreme Home Makeover* in their minds and did not realize that I would pay for our home through sweat equity and actual money!”

Jill earned 250 hours in sweat equity – helping with other Habitat projects, and cleaning, painting and helping install drywall

and insulation for her own home. The cost of construction is low because of volunteer labor; and Jill has an interest-free mortgage.

When asked what she learned from the Habitat experience, Jill said, “It wasn’t so much that I learned these things, but these things were confirmed to me: My daughter and I have been blessed with an amazing support system. There are many people that love us and want to see us do great things, and God always provides a way.”

The aspect of home ownership that Jill and Anessa are most looking forward to is having a yard for Anessa to play in, and having people over to help them make memories.

“I am thrilled to have a place that Anessa can call home!”

Habitat for Humanity established an agency endowment earlier this year. Gifts to the endowment will help them achieve their mission to help families by building homes and building lives.

A Time to Grow

“Phil...Ants...Throw...Peas,” chanted the fourth graders at Harrison Elementary School. If teaching nine-year-olds how to say “philanthropy” was the hard part, getting them to understand the concept of giving was the easy part.

Kosciusko Endowment Youth Services (KEYS), the youth philanthropy group of the Community Foundation, issued a challenge to Harrison Elementary School fourth graders as part of a pilot project to teach young people about how anyone can be a philanthropist.

Through skits and illustrations, KEYS members taught four classrooms of nine-year-olds about giving of their time, talent and treasure. At the end of the session, KEYS surprised the students with \$100 for each of their four classrooms and challenged them to use the money however they wanted to make a difference.

The classrooms decided to pool their money and buy flowers as a fundraiser. Many pre-sales took place until the gym was covered in pretty petals and floral fragrances. They used the money from the sale to buy pumpkin seeds to begin a garden plot right on school grounds.

The third grade was invited to join the fourth grade in caring for the garden...plowing, planting, weeding and finally harvesting. For many students, it was their first garden experience.

They will use the money from their fall pumpkin sales to keep the garden and the learning experience going; and they may use the proceeds to support school or charitable projects.

Next season they are planting sunflowers and sweet corn...and along with that practical lessons in planning, teamwork and the idea that you reap what you sow, good lessons for all of us.



KEYS consists of 20 members, eighth through twelfth graders from Lakeland Christian Academy, Tippecanoe Valley, Warsaw Community and Wawasee school corporations. Since the group's inception in 1996, they have awarded over \$250,000 in educational grants.

A Time to Heal

Donors who give to Community Funds are taking a step of faith. Essentially, because of the unrestricted nature of their gifts, they are saying to us, "We trust you to use this gift where it is needed most."

The Banks family's story demonstrates why those unrestricted gifts are so important.

When Vince and Nina Banks first took their one-year-old daughter, Elizabeth, to see her pediatrician, they thought she had a stomach virus. Elizabeth's pediatrician ordered lab work and discovered what was thought to be a problem with her liver. Vincent, Nina and Elizabeth were transferred, by ambulance, to Riley Children's Hospital in Indianapolis.

Once at Riley, it was discovered that it was Elizabeth's heart that was in trouble, not her liver. Over night, her parents stayed in one of Ronald McDonald House's (RMH) six sleeping rooms inside Riley Hospital. These rooms are for families with a child in the most critical situations.

Altogether, Elizabeth was in the hospital four months, with three of those months spent in intensive care. After Elizabeth's dad had to return to work, her parents and four siblings and grandparents began trading off days to ensure that family was always with her. RMH provided a comfortable place to sleep, wonderful meals and caring staff for their entire stay.

Elizabeth is now two-years-old, and doing well.

Nina and Vince were especially grateful to have a place to stay while Elizabeth was in the hospital, but they were also grateful for the "little things" that made their long stay easier; having a toothbrush those first few days before family could bring them clothes and toiletries, for example.

"I want your donors to know that their gifts help people in the time of unexpected crisis. You never think you are going to be the one to head to Riley. We didn't expect to be there more than a day...we were able to take care of our daughter while other things were taken care of for us... for that we are extremely grateful," said Nina.

A Time to Reconnect

In 1925, a group of Church of the Brethren young people convinced district officials to start a camp where they could be taught and encouraged in their relationships with God.

Beginning with six acres on Lake Waubee in Milford, Indiana, Camp Mack now includes over 200 acres of beaches, woods and some of Kosciusko County's most beautiful vistas. More than 14,000 people a year attend camps and retreats at the facility.

"Our goal is to be a sanctuary," said Camp Mack's Executive Director, Rex Miller. "A place for people to get refreshed, renewed and reconnected."

In order to provide such a sanctuary, the 84-year-old facility has operating and programming budget needs. Therefore, Camp Mack was in the middle of a capital campaign when they learned, in December of 2008, that the Community Foundation was issuing an operating endowment challenge.

The challenge provided county nonprofits with the opportunity to have a \$1.50 match by the Community Foundation for every dollar raised by the nonprofit toward an operating endowment. If a nonprofit

maximized this opportunity, then a \$4,000 contribution from them would be matched with \$6,000 from the Foundation.

The challenge fit with Camp Mack's goal to become more financially secure. They were already working hard to make sure they didn't become part of the trend in the camping industry to close because of financial instability.

The camp's one hesitancy was that they had already asked their donors to contribute to the capital campaign. Yet, they knew their donors well enough to know who would understand the urgency and opportunity presented by the challenge.

Camp Mack sent out a letter to select donors on January 12, 2009. They received their first gift toward the matching challenge on January 15th. They met their goal one day later. In fact, they surpassed their goal by 78%.

Camp Mack's reason for endowment building is the same as any other nonprofit's – to provide a reliable, ongoing source of revenue to support their mission, impact lives, and make their part of the world a better place.

24 nonprofits participated in the challenge.

\$141,509 was raised by nonprofits (some above and beyond what would be matched).

\$135,248 was matched by the Community Foundation.

9 new funds were created as a result of the challenge.



A Time for Progress

Imagine you have been laid off from your job at a manufacturing plant where you have worked for 15 years. Your job has helped you buy a home and provide for your children. Now, you are entering the job market along with hundreds of others in the same position, but you are at a major disadvantage. You don't have a high school diploma.

As the bills pile high, and the unemployment dries up, you are faced with the hard reality that you need to finish your education. You decide to get your General Education Diploma (GED).

Soon, thanks to the Kosciusko County GED Fund, a new fund at the Community Foundation, help paying for GED testing will be available to needy individuals. The fund was established as a result of a Kosciusko Youth Leadership Academy (KYLA) white paper project. Members of the project included Kaila Higgins, Sarah Jungbauer and Joel Widman, all high school students at Lakeland Christian Academy.

Higgins, Jungbauer and Widman were recognized at the Community Foundation's Heart of Gold awards for their efforts. They prove that there is no age restriction on being a philanthropist.

Each dropout, over a lifetime, costs the nation approximately \$260,000.

High school graduates live longer.

In Indiana, if dropouts from the class of 2008 graduated, they could cumulatively earn an additional \$5.9 million during their lifetimes.

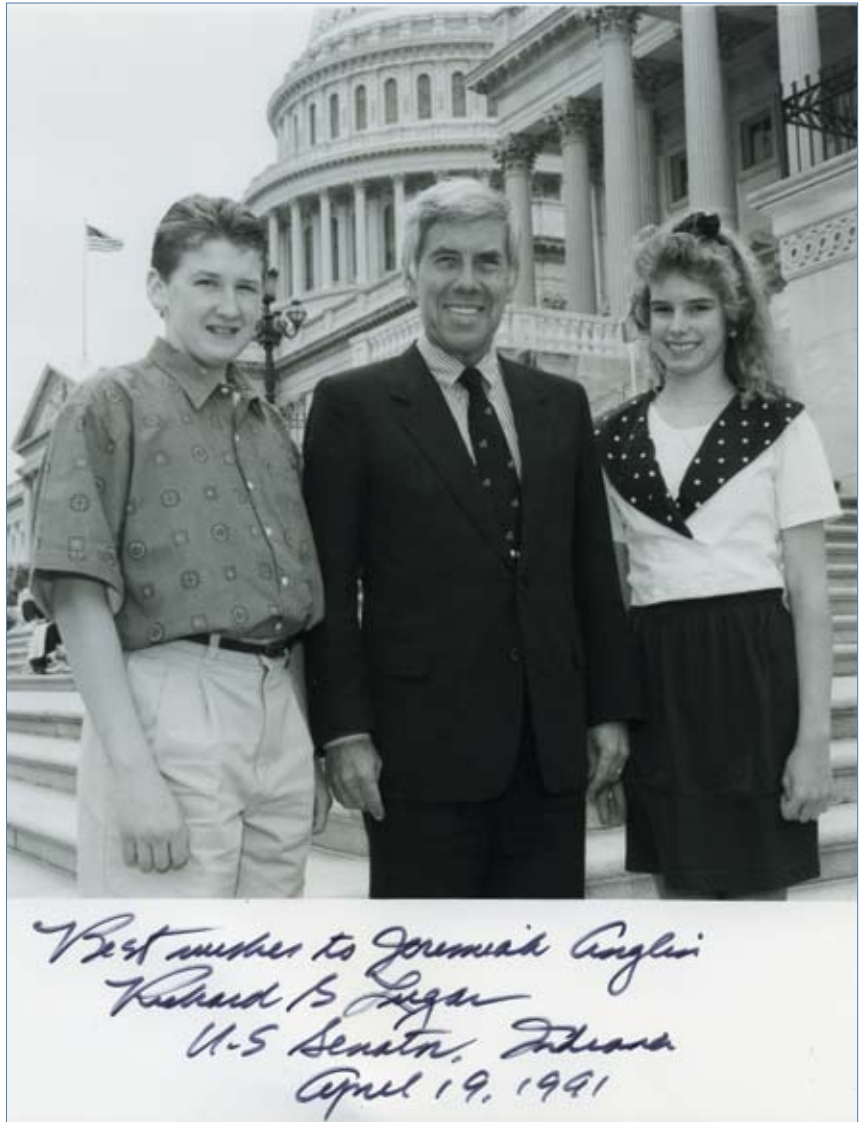
A Time to Remember

In May of this year, John "Jack" Anglin was nominated for a Heart of Gold Award. He was nominated for a lifetime of service beginning with his service to our country in World War II where he was active at the Battle of the Bulge and the Remagen Bridge. Active in Lions Club, Rotary, Masonic Lodge and Shriners, Anglin drives cancer patients to treatments, delivers Meals-on-Wheels, volunteers with the Salvation Army and the Historical Society and is an active board member of the Stony Point Cemetery.

Like the other 69 Heart of Gold recipients, Jack received an opportunity to award a Foundation grant, in his honor, to the charity of his choice. Jack chose to use the award to establish an endowment fund at the Community Foundation in memory of his grandson, Jeremiah Anglin.

There was something special about Jeremiah. In his short 15-years of life, he impacted young people and adults alike with his love of farming and zest for life. He was an honor roll student at Atwood Elementary and Edgewood Middle School. He was a talented basketball player and was very involved in 4-H and Future Farmer's of America.

When Jeremiah passed away as a result of a tragic automobile accident, the outpouring of grief and support for the family was tremendous. Atwood Elementary School established an award in Jeremiah's memory that was presented annually to an outstanding sixth grader. 4-H Junior Leaders established a memorial garden at the fairgrounds in honor of Jeremiah and his friend, Mike Bishop, who also died in the accident.

New Funds

American Teen Scholarship - Created with gifts from Paramount Vantage and Warsaw Community High School in celebration of the movie *American Teen*, which debuted in theaters in 2008 and featured the lives of Warsaw Community High School students during their senior year.

Jeremiah J. Anglin Memorial Fund - Established by John "Jack" Anglin in memory of his grandson, Jeremiah. Grants from the fund are advised by family members and preference is given to Kosciusko County 4-H and Future Farmers of Kosciusko County, Indiana.

Animal Welfare League Fund - Created by Animal Welfare League to help them achieve their mission to provide first-class care for the animals in their charge and to challenge our community to do the same.

Camp Mack Operations Endowment Fund - Established by Camp Mack to support their mission to provide a sanctuary where people connect with God through faith formation, experiencing creation and building Christian community.

Court Appointed Special Advocate Fund - Created by CASA to provide ongoing support for their operating needs, which will enable them to provide advocacy on behalf of area abused and neglected children.

Dixie Sternwheeler, Inc. Fund - Established by Dixie Sternwheeler, Inc. to provide support enabling the preservation of this historic watercraft.

Habitat for Humanity Operating Endowment Fund - Established by Habitat for Humanity of Kosciusko County to help support their mission to help families in our community by building homes and building lives.

The Deborah and Kevin Hohman Animal Care Scholarship Fund - Established to provide scholarships to graduates of Warsaw or Tippecanoe Valley schools to pursue a career in small animal care, or to help with the equipment needs of those desiring to work in small animal care.

Housing Opportunities of Warsaw Inc. Endowment Fund - Created by Housing Opportunities of Warsaw to provide an ongoing source of operating support to help them accomplish their mission to encourage and expand affordable housing by providing opportunity and choice through investing in people and communities.

ICDI Operating Endowment Fund - Established by Integrated Community Development International to provide this faith-based organization operating support for their work in central Africa focused on developing local leadership and empowering local communities to overcome difficult problems on their own. ICDI is based out of Winona Lake, Indiana.

Jackson Scholarship Fund - Established by Brad and Tracy Jackson to provide scholarship assistance. Tracy is a Community Foundation board member.

Kosciusko County General Educational Development (GED) Fund Established as a result of a Kosciusko Youth Leadership Academy white paper project. Members of this project included Kaila Higgins, Sarah Jungbauer and Joel Widman. The fund will, when fully funded, help pay for GED testing to worthy and needy individuals who are residents of Kosciusko County with preference given to clients of the Beaman Home.

Kosciusko County Right to Life Fund - Created by Kosciusko County Right to Life to help them achieve their mission to help people understand that all human life is precious, from conception to natural death.

Dan Kinsey Memorial Scholarship - Friends and family of Dan Kinsey established this scholarship in his memory. Dan was a native of Warsaw. He taught English and was involved in many extracurricular activities at McCutcheon High School in West Lafayette, Indiana. Scholarships assist graduating seniors of McCutcheon High School, with special consideration given to those majoring in education.

Savina Kralis Nursing Scholarship Fund to Benefit Ancilla College - Created by Savina Kralis to provide support to Ancilla College to enable the Poor Handmaids of Jesus Christ to provide scholarship grants to worthy and needy students pursuing nursing or related studies.

McDonald Memorial Scholarship Fund - Dr. Angus C. McDonald came to Warsaw in 1892. He established the first hospital in Warsaw, and was one of the founders and the first president of Bakers' Boys Club. This scholarship helps traditional and non-traditional students from Kosciusko County achieve their educational dreams.

Milford Public Library Fund - Established to support the mission of the Milford Public Library.

William M. and Delores A. Pittenger Memorial Endowment Fund Established by Delores Pittenger to provide support to charitable organizations providing services to Warsaw residents.

Sergeant Terry Polston Memorial Fund - Created by many friends and family members of Terry Polston. Terry was a beloved Drug Abuse Resistance Education (DARE) officer when he passed away in 2008 after a long battle with cancer. As a tribute to Terry, this scholarship benefits students who exemplify the characteristics taught in DARE and who might need encouragement in order to reach their full potential.

Margaret Reafsnnyder Memorial Scholarship Fund - Established by Margaret Reafsnnyder in her will to provide scholarship assistance to graduates of Warsaw Community High School for the study of pharmacy, nursing and/or medicine.

Tippecanoe Watershed Foundation Endowment Fund - Established by Tippecanoe Watershed Foundation to support their mission to promote the understanding and management of our lakes, streams and watershed, fostering their restoration and preservation for today and for the future.

Wawasee Area Conservancy Foundation Endowment Fund - Established by Wawasee Area Conservancy Foundation to support their mission to preserve and enhance the Wawasee area watershed for present and future generations.

WBG Fund - Created to facilitate Wildman Business Group's charitable giving program.

Youth Recruitment & Retention Hunting, Fishing, Trapping, and Shooting Sports Education Fund - Established to support youth education for people 17-years-old or younger in outdoor recreation and conservation activities, with primary focus on fair chase hunting, fishing, trapping and recreational shooting sports activities in Kosciusko County. The fund will assist local nonprofit youth programs in Kosciusko County in conducting these outdoor recreation and conservation activities.

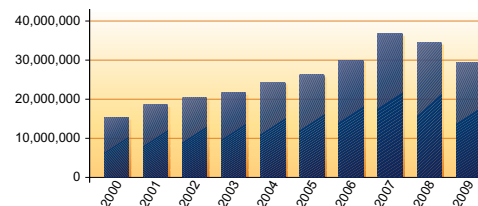

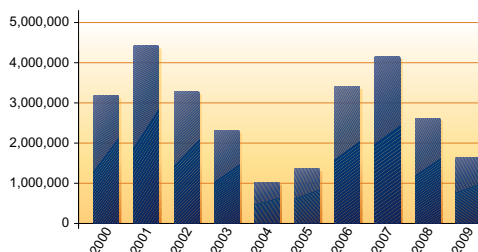

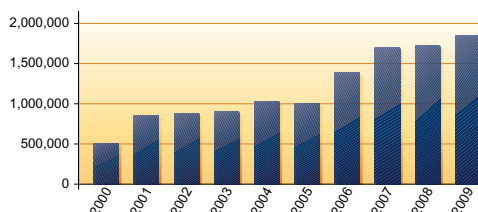
